Day 1: Sunday, February 14: Travel to Bangkok

Day 2: Monday, February 15: Arrive in Bangkok

If an overnight stay required, the most convenient hotel is the Bangkok Novotel Suvarnabhumi Airport Hotel. (Please note: not included in tour price.)



Day 3: Tuesday, February 16: Bangkok \rightarrow Yangon

Depart Bangkok on Thai Airways flight TG303 at 8:30 a.m. and arrive mid-morning in Yangon. (Please note: not included in tour price. You must book and purchase on your own.) After a visit to Bogyoke Market, we spend the afternoon at the resplendent 2,500 year old Shwedagon Pagoda, for insight into the deeply spiritual lives of the Burmese people.

Day 4: Wednesday, February 17 Yangon

Today we visit the Chinese market, the bustling Yangon River Harbor and the 220foot long Chauk Htat Gyi Reclining Buddha.

Day 5: Thursday, February 18 Yangon → Mandalay

Our morning flight takes us to Mandalay and a stop at the marble Buddha carving pavilions to observe one of Mandalay's most important cottage industries. At Mahamuni Pagoda, Burma's 12-foot high, most revered Buddha statue glistens with gold leaf that worshippers have burnished onto his body. We then observe the process of gold-leaf making and visit the intricately carved Shwe Nan Daw Monastery, once part of the Royal Palace. Nearby, Kuthodaw is the world's largest book, which houses the *tripitaka*, or Buddhist scriptures. Tonight we enjoy a presentation of the Mandalay Marionettes.



Day 6: Friday, February 19 Mandalay

Morning at the boat jetty reveals fascinating scenes from daily life on the Ayerwaddy River, made familiar to the world by Kipling as "The Road to Mandalay." We continue to Ava, the longest standing capital of the Shan Dynasty, where the ruined temple contains magnificent Buddha statues from the Shan period. We visit the silk weaving, tapestry and marionette workshops, where puppets are intricately carved and lavishly dressed in ornate costumes. Save room in your luggage for souvenirs and gifts! Depending on flight schedules, we fly to Bagan or enjoy sunset at the U-Bein Bridge and overnight in Mandalay.



Day 7: Saturday, February 20 Bagan

Prepare to be enchanted by this paragon of living history and spirituality. Since the 11th century Buddhist pilgrims have come here to build temples and pagodas, in hopes of achieving nirvana. Today thousands of these shrines glorify the landscape, pushing their way gracefully toward the sky, as if joined in one majestic prayer. They bear witness to Buddhist devotion, their grandeur undiminished through the centuries. We explore the historic and architectural sites, including Kay Min Ga, Ananda, Manuha and Shwe San Daw, followed by a (hopefully!) magnificent sunset.

Day 8: Sunday, February 21 Bagan

Weather permitting, we'll witness sunrise from a hot air balloon flight over pagodas, temples and the

Ayerwaddy River. It is a magical, not-to-be-missed experience! We then explore the environs of Bagan, ending at Yoke Soun Monastery, which has been converted to a museum that houses some of Myanmar's most important religious artifacts and scriptures. The monastery's exquisite teak carvings depict scenes from Lord Buddha's life, and from the 550 reincarnations of Siddharta. Of course no trip to Bagan would be complete without a visit to the lacquerware workshop, where we see first hand why the artisans are celebrated for the beauty and delicacy of their work. After admiring this labor of love, you won't resist taking home one of these treasures.





Day 9: Monday, February 22 Bagan \rightarrow Pindaya

Today we fly to Heho and drive to the charming mountain village of Pindaya. It is the epitome of an unspoiled land, where families engage in cottage industries of making Shan paper, parasols and terracotta pottery. Our last stop is the Pindaya Caves, which shelter 9000 Buddha statues that pilgrims have placed here since the 16th century. The effect is awe-awe-inspiring, and legend insists that if you persevere far enough into the cave you'll come to Bagan.

Day 10: Tuesday, February 23 Pindaya \rightarrow Inle Lake Early risers won't want to miss Pindaya Lake wake up and come to life. Scenes from daily life might include ox-drawn carts, bathing & washing clothes, or water pots balanced expertly on the bearer's head. We then drive to Inle Lake, a

world unto itself. Intha people live in charming hamlets in the lake, tend their floating gardens, and fish from flat bottom boats. The fishermen are known for their unique, graceful, one-legged rowing technique. The villages are untouched by modern world intrusions, sitting on stilts, in complete harmony with the environment.





Day 11: Wednesday, February 24 Inle Lake

This morning we visit the 12th century ruined pagoda complex of In Daing. The *stupas* and stucco carvings are superb examples of Shan architecture. Time-permitting, other stops might include the silk-weaving factory, a market, or whatever fascinating daily life scenes attract our attention. There are sure to be many.

Day 12: Thursday, February 25 Inle Lake Today we continue our exploration of Inle Lake's many wonders.

Day 13: Friday, February 26 Inle Lake \rightarrow Yangon Fly to Yangon for the end of our all-too-brief, magical journey.

Day 14: Saturday, February 27 Yangon \rightarrow Bangkok Thai Airways flight TG 304 at 9:45 a.m.

Day 15: Sunday, February 28 Bangkok \rightarrow Onward destinations

Tour price

The tour price, based on a minimum of 6 participants, **includes** domestic flights within Burma, ground transportation, 11 nights of deluxe accommodations, all meals from lunch on February 16 through breakfast on February 27, entrance fees, hot air balloon ride, tips of a group nature and the services of an English-speaking local guide. The tour price **does not include** international airfare to Yangon, overnight in Bangkok (if required), tourist visa, beverages and tip to local guide.

Deposit

A \$500 deposit is required to register and secure a place on the tour. The balance is due 60 days prior to the departure date. The deposit is fully refundable if notice is given 60 days prior to the departure date.

International airline tickets

You must book and purchase your own airline tickets to Bangkok, and between Bangkok and Yangon.

Passport and Visa Requirement

A passport with 6 months validity and a visa are required to enter Burma.
