# Uncommon Journeys, LLC Ethiopia: Journey into the Medieval Past 2007 Itinerary

#### Day 1: Sunday, January 14 or Monday, January 15 Travel to Addis Ababa

#### Day 2: Tuesday, January 16 Addis Ababa

Arrive in Addis Ababa.

#### Day 3: Wednesday, January 17 Addis Ababa → Lalibela

Fly to Lalibela, the former capital of a 12<sup>th</sup> century dynasty. We visit several rock-hewn churches built during that period, which still stand in testimony to the power of the Ethiopian Orthodox faith, which is practiced by half of Ethiopians.

#### Day 4: Thursday, January 18 Lalibela

The Ketra celebration marks the beginning of the eve of the Timket, or Epiphany celebrations. The festivities begin with a procession of priests bearing sacred icons, manuscripts and crosses. They converge onto the ceremonial grounds for several hours of holy mass, kinetic dancing, chanting, drumming and trilling ululations.

#### Day 5: Friday, January 19 Lalibela → Axum

The ceremonial grounds are filled to capacity on Timket morning, and yesterday's chaos is tamed as if someone has waved a magic wand over the town. Following the mass, icons and followers are anointed with holy water to commemorate Christ's baptism, and the precious icons are returned to the churches. This afternoon we fly to Axum.

#### Day 6: Saturday, January 20 Axum

If you thought the Timket processions were fantastic, wait until you see the pageantry of the Feast of Saint Michael! The priests themselves, resplendent in fine brocade vestments, carrying crosses and leaning against prayer sticks, are like icons from a medieval past. This afternoon we visit historic sites of Axum, an important stop on caravan routes dating back 2000 years. Our stops include several 10<sup>th</sup> century obelisks, each carved from a single piece of stone, and the ruins of the Queen of Sheba's palace. Her son, Menelik I, reputedly brought the Ark of the Covenant to Axum from his father, King Solomon of Jerusalem, and it is said to be sheltered here, in the 17<sup>th</sup> century Cathedral of St. Mary of Zion.

#### Day 7: Sunday, January 21 Axum → Bahir Dar

Fly to Bahir Dar.

#### Day 8: Monday, January 22 Bahir Dar

This morning we explore the villages around Bahir Dar and visit the Blue Nile Falls. Dropping over a  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile wide and 150 foot deep chasm, it is a miracle of nature and vision of grandeur. Note: if the dam is closed, we will not be able to view the falls.

#### Day 9: Tuesday, January 23 Bahir Dar

We cross Lake Tana, source of the Blue Nile, stopping to explore several small islands which shelter medieval churches and monasteries.

#### Day 10: Wednesday, January 24 Bahir Dar → Addis Ababa

Fly to Addis Ababa for a traditional Ethiopian dinner.

#### Day 11: Thursday, January 25 Addis Ababa → Afar

We fly to Dessie, then drive to Afar.

#### Day 12: Friday, January 26 Afar

We explore the Afar region, which is home to the Afar nomads, who wrest a living from salt mines, using camels as beasts of burden.

#### Day 13: Saturday, January 27 Afar → Addis Ababa

### Day 14: Sunday, January 28 Departure
