We explore the Omo Valley, a narration of Southern Ethiopia's ethnic diversity, where proud nations of Hamer, Karo, Mursi and Elbore tribes still live the way they have for centuries. The cradle of civilization was almost certainly here, and the first inhabitants were stone-age people who thrived along the rich shores of the many lakes created by the Great Rift, or last massive movement of the earth. For anyone interested in tribal cultures, Ethiopia bestows all the rewards of visiting an exotic destination and its remarkable inhabitants.

Please note: The rewards of travel and photography are even greater when we explore remote, uncharted regions. As such:

- The Jinka Hotel (1 night) has cold water showers and electricity for 5 hours in the evening.
- Accommodations at Evangadi (3 nights) involve "camping" in private, bungalow-style "tents." We provide privacy tents with portable cold-water showers and non-flushing toilets. Our generator provides 3 hours of light each evening, but there are no plugs for using or charging digital cameras or electrical appliances. Our private chef, Mr. Wolde, will treat us to the best home-cooking and hospitality in Ethiopia.
- Ethiopia's stone age tribes are among the most exotic and photogenic in the world. They can also be among the most aggressive. Always get permission before taking someone's portrait, and be sensitive to the fact that some will not want to be photographed. Photographing someone against their will violates their privacy and is treated as a very serious infraction. It could result in the confiscation of film and cameras, and place the group at serious risk.
- Several days require long drives over rough terrain in a Toyota Land Cruiser.
- Ethiopia is dusty!

Uncommon Journeys, LLC Ethiopia: Journey into the Stone Ages 2007 Itinerary

Day 1: Sunday, January 7 or Monday, January 8 Travel to Addis Ababa

Day 2: Tuesday, January 9 Addis Ababa

Arrive in Addis Ababa.

Day 3: Wednesday, January 10 Addis Ababa → Arba Minch

Drive to Arba Minch.

Day 4: Thursday, January 11 Arba Minch → Jinka

Full day drive to Jinka, stopping to photograph people of the Tsemay tribe.

Day 5: Friday, January 12 Jinka → Turmi

Visit the Mursi tribe, where women are distinguished by their terracotta lip plates and earlobe disks. They slit their bottom lips lengthwise and remove their bottom teeth in order to accommodate the terracotta disk. The Mursi subsist on milk and cows' blood, practice shamanism, and believe that harmony of nature follows harmony of society. They are fond of public speaking, debating and meetings, which are sources of entertainment and drama for the village.

Day 6: Saturday, January 13 Turmi/Omo Valley

Visit a village of the endangered Karo tribe, with a population numbering less than 600. Scarification, body painting and exuberant dances are hallmarks of their society. The men decorate themselves with paint made from white chalk, yellow mineral rock, iron ore and charcoal. These colors are believed to transform the body and release the spirit. Their makeup is of great importance because it enables men to exhibit their beauty and attract a wife. A Karo man may take as many wives as he likes, and usually marries 2 or 3.

Day 7: Sunday, January 14 Omo Valley

This morning we visit the friendly, elegant Elbore, one of many tribes belonging to the Borana ethnic group. Our afternoon stops will introduce us to the Hamer tribe. The women wear elaborate hairstyles concocted from red ochre and clarified butter, aluminum jewelry and wrap around skirts of animal skins embellished with cowrie shells. They are agro-pastoralists, skilled in pottery, beekeeping and smithying.

Day 8: Monday, January 15 Omo Valley \rightarrow Arba Minch

Drive to Arba Minch.

Day 9: Tuesday, January 16 Arba Minch → Addis Ababa

Drive to Addis Ababa and enjoy a traditional Ethiopia dinner.

Day 10: Wednesday, January 17 Departure

Depart for USA or continue on Ethiopia: A Journey into the Medieval Past.
